Party for centaurs

Imagine the most raucous party you've ever been to. Alcohol flows freely, couples make out in every corner, there's three fights going on simultaneously and the place is a mess. Now times that by ten. Welcome to the party of the centaurs.

Pupils with Jupiter in Sagittarius seize life by the throat, shake it all about, wave it from the flagpole, dunk it into their coffee and then come back for seconds. Or thirds. Their enthusiasm is exhausting, their questions never-ending, their energy ever-flowing. Teach them to read? Chances are they started reading well before you ever met them. Kant, Marx, Derrida, Foucault, Hume, Plato, Camus and Chomsky? They've been on their Kindles since kindergarten. You won't teach these pupils anything. They will teach you.

Or so they like to think.

The trick in handling Jupiter in Sagittarius pupils is to think big. Give them something to chew on so they will stop asking questions for long enough for you to direct them towards an answer. This too is key: let them find their own answers. Reluctant learners simply have not had the right opportunities to thrive. Keep changing the seating arrangements and mix groups often. As they learn, these pupils can be shockingly

Ever optimistic, they often over estimate their own abilities – all the time. You won't change them. Just make sure to keep a school-wide detention strategy or you will be home late every single night.

Of course these pupils do calm down. Eventually. But only a little bit. By fifteen, their lives (and probably yours) will be utter chaos and everyone wonders if they will ever be ready for exams. And then suddenly, they sort themselves out. They realise they want to do well in their exams because if they don't, they may miss out on their big chance to blow town and hit the road to seek newer, bigger adventures.

If you are a teacher with Jupiter in Sagittarius, chances are you enjoy thinking you're the life of every staff party and every pupil's favourite

teacher. It doesn't matter how many times everyone tells you that you can't sing, you're still the first, last and middle of the karaoke queue. You're also the first in line for the buffet, bar, dance floor but the last to call a cab. You may have learned that physical punch-ups aren't much fun, but you still enjoy antagonising everyone. This goes for your pupils as well. You have more complaints for stepping on your pupils' dogmatic (from your point of view) beliefs than all the other teachers put together. The head teacher hates you and has been trying to sack you for ages but can't get anything to stick. There is nowhere you haven't been, no language you are unable to speak and no person living who doesn't want to tear the skin from your pudding. Case study – Hillary Clinton



Hillary's foray into politics began when she was thirteen and canvassing South Side Chicago in 1960 when she found evidence of electoral fraud

against Richard Nixon. During this year, transiting Jupiter began a series of three oppositions to Uranus in Gemini. She was a teacher's pet and graduated in the top five per cent of her class. She enrolled in the all girls' college, Wellesley, in 1965 and was the institution's first student commencement speaker in 1969 as Jupiter was conjunct natal Neptune in Libra.

In the summer of 1973, Saturn was conjunct Uranus in Gemini and she had received her Juris Doctor degree and Bill Clinton proposed to

her. She demurred because she was concerned she would lose her identity and become over-shadowed by his. Shortly after this, she was a member of the impeachment inquiry staff in Washington during the Watergate scandal. With Saturn opposite her North Node in Capricorn in the summer of 1974, she learned she had failed the District of Columbia bar exam but passed the Arkansas exam. She decided to follow Bill to

Arkansas. In the spring of 1975, Jupiter had opposed her Neptune and shortly after, she agreed to marry Bill.

In October 1978, Jupiter began a series of squares to her natal Sun. During this time, she began gambling in Cattle Futures contracts, a successfully speculative venture that ended when she discovered she was pregnant with her daughter Chelsea as Jupiter was opposite her North Node in July 1979. She had made \$100,000 on a \$1,000 investment in cattle, but the winnings were to prove a thorn in her side. During this time, she and Bill had also become entangled with the Whitewater Development Corporation.

As Saturn conjoined her Sun in 1983, she was named Arkansas Woman of the Year. In 1992, Bill was made the Democrat candidate for presidency. Saturn in Aquarius made a series of three oppositions to her Mars in Gemini. During this time, it was alleged Bill had had an affair with a nightclub singer. To allay the rumours, they appeared on *60 Minutes* together. Bill admitted he had caused pain in his marriage but denied the affair. Although credited for rescuing his campaign, Hillary had caused outrage by seeming to insult women who stay at home baking cookies and hosting tea parties. The appearance drew comparisons to Lady Macbeth.

In 1993, Jupiter was in conjunction with her Neptune when the Clintons took office. Just before the final conjunction, Vince Foster had committed suicide and Hillary had been implicated in removing files on the night of his death. She was also accused of firing White House staff and replacing them with staff from Arkansas, a scandal which became known as Travelgate (perfect for a Jupiter to Neptune transit).

By the end of 1993 Jupiter was conjunct her Sun. Her ambitious (and contentious) healthcare plan had been proposed earlier that year and had met with such opposition that in 1994 she was forced to wear a bullet-proof vest. She was eventually subpoenaed to appear before the federal grand jury over the Whitewater Development Corporation scandal, the first First Lady to have been ordered to do so. She was eventually cleared of any wrongdoing in 2000 as both Jupiter and then Saturn opposed her natal Jupiter.

In 1998 the Lewinsky scandal broke out. Bill Clinton would eventually be impeached and then acquitted later than summer. During this time, Hillary publically defended her husband and eventually decided to stand

by him in light of his infidelities. In 2000, transiting Saturn and then Jupiter began a series of oppositions to her Sun in Scorpio in the wake of her husband's relations with Lewinsky, and Hillary and her husband were forced to deal with the astronomical legal bills accrued as a result of the hearings. She eventually admitted in 2014 that they had left the White House in debt, just after transiting Saturn was conjunct her natal Sun.

Hillary's successful bid for State Senate in 2000 took place as Saturn then Jupiter made a series of oppositions to the natal place of Jupiter and Venus in Sagittarius. In 2015, as transiting Saturn was conjunct her natal Jupiter and Venus and as Jupiter in Leo was in a series of three squares to her natal Sun in Scorpio, she announced her candidacy for US presidency. Although she would lose the election, she did become the 5th presidential candidate in history to win the popular vote but yet still lose the election.

Clinton has won many awards, particularly for her work with women, children and health. In Gallup polls, she has been named 'Most Admired Woman' ten times in a row.
